
Paula Fern Gedly Gedly right. This isn't the first time the regional council has brought this up for discussion and even formed a consultation group. It ended up being a way to shift the burden of rates to the townships by stealth, and the consultation group wasn't in agreement so were quietly shutdown. The wording this time seems to be eluding to this approach again. We have braided rivers that have been encroached on by stopbanks built too close to the rivers and farming practices not in harmony with the river ecosystem. We have aggradation (gravel) buildup) because of a combination of those stopbanks being too close and an over allocation of water for irrigation. Normal flows push gravel down the rivers; flood events push them further to the coast where it's needed, and also used to change the river course and feed the soils. This isn't happening. Removing gravel is creating an ongoing cost and refusing to look at the big picture, and shifting focus away from how we need to radically change what we are doing. What do you think Chris?



Jarred Bird Jason Christensen the sediment will come down regardless in a flood event if not worse if the channel gets too shallow because it will erode all the historic silt deposits on the flood plain as the water velocity will be increased. What you need to focus on is stopping new silt and clay particles from entering the river from adioining land.

Jason Christensen Jarred Bird water velocity is increased if you reduced the channel, not increase it. That is an outright no brainer. Yes, silt will come down regardless, but the more you extract, the less opportunity there is for heavy particles to settle. Simple physics will show you these things. You can reduce erosion of flood plains by not spraying inside and alongside the water body, and replanting the river edges with decent rooting plants like flax. Restored wetlands are proven. Rivers will always alter route according to the land. It's how it's been forever. It's accepted that around towns it needs to be controlled. You need to realize that narrowing the natural bed of a river by extracting gravel does not slow, nor decrease the water flow. It increases the ferocity of that flow, shifting more gravel. Flood plains ARE the natural route for natural high water events. Putting a high lip on it may contain it in most instances, but it won't stop every one. Yes, I understand that digging a channel moves it and encourages it to go where you tell it, but the consequence is you're smothering the seabed. When you understand the dance of the Awa, and it's journey from Maunga to Moana, then you will understand that no matter where you upset the balance in the chain, you alter the end result.

Jarred Bird Jason Christensen yep as I said and extracting the gravel is increasing the channel size slowing the water down. Allowing more silt to fall out of suspension and the silt will be removed with the next lot of gravel removed once the beach has built back up.

It's only going to get worse as more trees are removed up in the head waters of the rivers wilding pine removal in the Kaweka's etc. Thousands of tonnes of silt used to get removed from the Lower Tukituki every year, none now gets removed and will keep making its way out to sea.

Jarred Bird Jason Christensen the Tukituki is all but stuffed now, can't remove anything below the Waipawa river due to needle grass. The large flat areas left by gravel extraction on inside bends used to catch a heap of silt. That's why they were always taken as other boney areas required the addition of silt to the aggregate costing more. So now they are gone a higher percentage will just carry on out to sea. Even the raw silt used to be taken for fill material on jobs removing a huge amount from the system.



Jarred Bird Jason Christensen you edited one of the previous posts, how is it that you think gravel extraction narrows the river? Think of it like a hose pre extraction it's like a garden hose small and confined, post extraction it's like putting that same volume of water through a 50mm hose. The water would barely trickle out due to how much the velocity has decreased. It's basic fluid dynamics.
